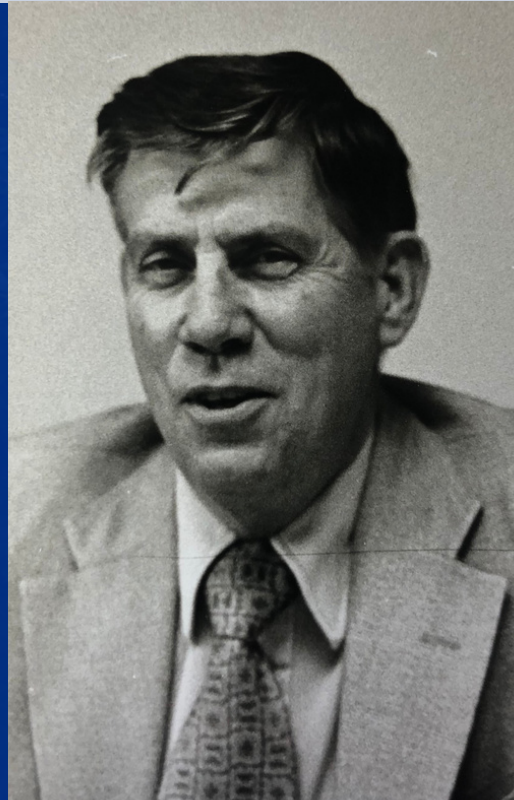

BRADD's founding Executive Director, Jack Eversole, peacefully passed on Sunday, August 1, 2020. Kentucky is a better place to live because of people like Jack who advocated for efficiencies in regionalism and brought about tremendous growth and change through their own leadership.

Jack was born in London, Kentucky, and proudly served in the South Pacific for the United States Marine Corps. He was a graduate of the University of Kentucky and Western KY University. Before coming to BRADD he worked in journalism and communications in Glasgow and Bowling Green, was on the Bowling Green-Warren County Planning Commission, and served as a Warren County Magistrate. In 1987 Senator Mitch McConnell said, "Jack's nineteen years of dedicated service to South Central Kentucky area has contributed to its successful economic growth and development."

The late Governor Louie B Nunn, whose administration brought to full fruition the regional concept of area development districts, once stated, "Jack Eversole very quietly, modestly and effectively, through his personal commitment and leadership, gave the Barren River District accomplishment, a unity of purpose and success not excelled by any others."

At our 50th Annual Meeting in 2018, Jack was honored for his contributions to the region as he received the Tim Lee Carter Award. Let us all remember fondly the man who helped build this organization. Our thoughts and prayers go out to his son Jay, grandchildren and the many, many friends and colleagues across the state.

A WORD FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



As the COVID-19 pandemic struck our Commonwealth our mission and services became even more relevant.

We bridged gaps in economic shortfalls and increased our game in human services as we became a viaduct for our community.

The close of fiscal year 2020 marked my third full year at BRADD. The statement, “2020 came with a few surprises,” is definitely an understatement. My biggest take away is perhaps Area Development Districts showed up in 2020. As the COVID-19 pandemic struck our Commonwealth our mission and services became even more relevant. We bridged gaps in economic shortfalls and increased our game in human services as we became a viaduct for our community. Last year our region experienced a 54% turnover in local elected officials. Those officials have quickly learned what BRADD brings to the table and have become advocates for regionalism. All in all, we crossed over into another year of growth!

As of June 30, 2020 BRADD administered over \$16.2 million of local project investment through our Community & Economic Development department. Our talented GIS Manager developed a comprehensive COVID-19 Regional Impacts dashboard providing local decision makers assistance navigating a pandemic. In addition, while spanning 36 grant applications for our communities, we expanded our Revolving Loan Fund program, providing seven Business Relief Working Capital loans totaling nearly \$100,000 of investment.

Between March 1 and June 30, 2020, BRADD, through our providers, ensured 23,490 meals were delivered to our most vulnerable population. Our robust Area Agency on Aging & Independent Living served over 6,000 clients expending nearly \$9.2 million of investment. These services traverse programs like Participant Directed Services, Family Caregiver, Home Care and Personal Care Attendant with services like Home Delivered Meals, Respite, and Case Management.

This fiscal year BRADD carried forward an overall fund balance, continuing a path of conservative fiscal accountability and budgeting. While the majority of our funding dollars are true pass-thru, it is evident BRADD’s finance department works tirelessly to maximize dollars in programs benefiting the 308,919 citizens of our fast growing region. Southcentral Kentucky is the best place to live and work! On behalf of the BRADD, we present the fiscal year 2020 Annual Report as a link to the work performed each and every day to improve the quality of life and economic well-being of our citizens.

September 2019

January-February 2020

May 2020

BRADD began offering COVID-19 Business Relief Working Capital Loans.

April 2020

June 2020

BRADD received NADO recognition for our work with Glasgow Transit to make routes available via Google Maps.

July-August 2019

BRADD hosted a food drive bridging food insecurity resources with individual need throughout the region.

October 2019

BRADD honored Ms. Velvee Tapp of Barren County for her 104th birthday. BRADD Aging Staff also attended a statewide hunger summit.

March 2020

After a closure of the area senior centers, BRADD began working with providers to offer an increased number of meals to seniors in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

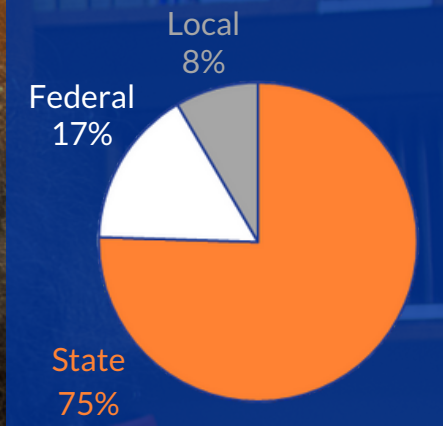

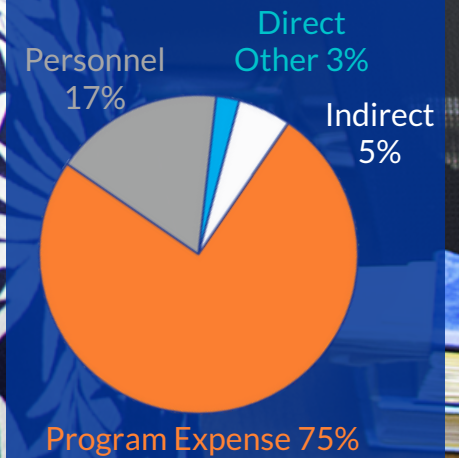

Year End FY20 Expenses

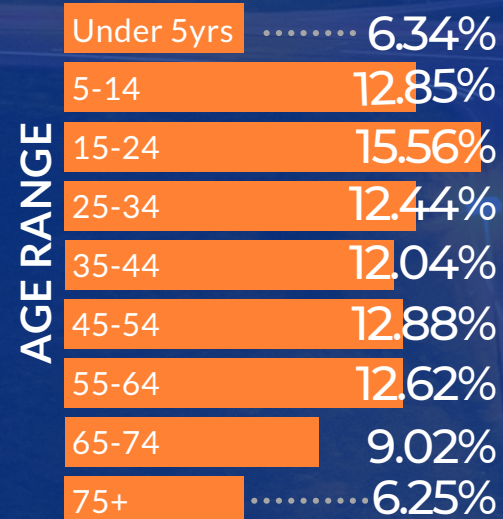

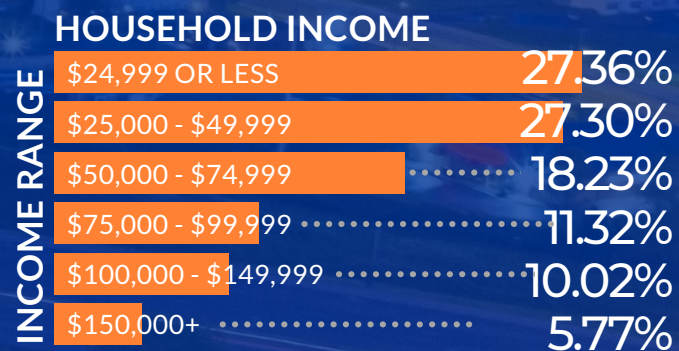

AGING & INDEPENDENT LIVING SERVICES

The Barren River Area Development District (BRADD) is a state and federal designated Area Agency on Aging and Independent Living (AAAIL) under the direction of the U. S. Administration on Aging and Community Living and under the supervision of the State Department for Aging and Independent Living. The BRADD/AAAIL holds the responsibility of developing and administering a wide variety of comprehensive, coordinated, and cost-effective, in-home and community based services. These services help older and disabled individuals to maintain their dignity and quality of life, while living safely in their homes and communities. The AAAIL is administered by BRADD/AAAIL staff, advised by Barren River Aging Advisory Council, and operated under the supervision of the Barren River Area Development District Board of Directors.

FEEDING THE REGION

A key service of BRADD's Area Agency on Aging and Independent Living is providing meals for seniors. Meals are provided in both a congregate and home-delivered system, based on the need of the client. In March of 2020, when Governor Beshear's executive orders required many of our Senior Centers to suspend normal operations as preventative measures to protect our vulnerable populations from the impacts of COVID-19, BRADD's AAAIL and our Senior Center providers pivoted operations to ensure our clients would not go hungry. Beginning April 20, 2020, the senior centers operated by Community Action began serving hot curbside lunches to seniors 60 years of age and older. Despite senior centers being closed, congregate and home delivered meal services continued to serve our most vulnerable elderly citizens throughout the pandemic. Meals that would have normally been offered as a congregate meal at the center were instead served take-out style due to social distancing measures. Participants also had the option to send a designated representative (with proper ID) to pick up the meal for them if they were unable or concerned with leaving their home during this time. From March 1 to June 30, 2020, BRADD ensured over 23,000 meals were delivered to area AAAIL clients.

Throughout the year, BRADD partnered with local businesses (such as Shiloh Industries pictured here) to receive donations of food and commodities to distribute to those in need throughout the region. From June 2019 to July 2020, BRADD received donations from Shiloh Industries, Inc., Save-a-lot, IGA's, Piggly Wiggly, Barren River Adult Day Health, and Houchens stores as well as Pleasant View Baptist Church. These donations contributed to the distribution of 97 bags of food and helped support 160 individuals.

COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

BRADD's Planning and Development Department acts as a concierge for local elected leaders, community stakeholders, business owners, entrepreneurs, and economic developers who are looking to enhance the quality of life for citizens, attract new businesses, or retain/expand existing businesses within the 10-county region. This is accomplished through numerous community and economic development services provided by the department including community comprehensive planning, water and wastewater planning, transportation planning, emergency management planning, grant writing & administration, business services, GIS services, and technical assistance to local governments. Additionally, department staff regularly coordinate with various experts to provide our communities with quality training and information on a range of topics from planning & zoning to transit driver safety.

At the foundation of the department is the BRADD's Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (or CEDS). This guiding document is a critical mechanism that helps identify regional vulnerability and prevent or respond to economic disruptions; and is a critical component of economic resilience. Annually, the Planning & Development department reviews the BRADD's Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy and makes any needed updates. TRAINING AREA TRANSIT DRIVERS

On December 13 and 14, 2019, BRADD hosted a Driver Safety Simulator Training course presented by the Fulton County Transit Authority. Over two dozen public transportation drivers for the City of Bowling Green's GO by Transit; the City of Glasgow's Transit; and the City of Scottsville's Transit participated in small-group sessions to learn safety tips and techniques while driving. Groups had a chance to use cutting-edge simulation technology to practice vehicle maneuvers. Behind the wheel of the simulators, those being trained were faced with scenarios where they had to rely on their current skill set. Once the simulator scenario was concluded, trainers reviewed decisions with the students and offered suggestions for outcome improvement.

This training was provided at no cost to the attendees or the transit systems. Instead, BRADD utilized technical assistance funding from KYTC: Office of Transportation Delivery and the Rural Transit Assistance Program. BRADD typically receives transportation technical assistance funding annually, and is continually looking at ways to provide additional training and services to regional transit providers.

REGIONAL DATA DASHBOARD CREATED

In April 2020, BRADD GIS Manager designed a data dashboard to aggregate COVID-19 case information within the 10-county region. Utilizing existing information from the official Commonwealth COVID-19 Dashboard, found at kycovid19.ky.gov, the regional dashboard shares local COVID-19 case information, including number of confirmed cases and numerous county-level data points, with the citizens of the Barren River Region in an easy-to-use format. The Kentucky Department of Public Health (KDPH) provides daily data updates to the Commonwealth Office of Technology - Division of Geographic Information Systems (COT-DGI), who in turn, publish web-based GIS mapping services for public use. This information forms the underlying structure of the BRADD's Regional Database. Since its inception, BRADD continually monitors numerous COVID-19 data sources, and adds new data points to the dashboard as they become available.

2020 ALLEN COUNTY

SR. CENTER BINGO BY PHONE

In May 2020, the Allen County Senior Center, funded by BRADD's AAAIL, began an innovative approach to keeping senior center participants engaged with the center and each other amidst the COVID-19 global pandemic: Bingo by Phone. Prior to beginning, the Senior Center mailed each participant a packet including directions, a blank bingo card, and a numbered photo listing of available prizes. Then, each Tuesday and Thursday from May 12 through July 2, senior center staff would record an automated voicemail with four random numbers. Seniors could then call the voicemail number after 1pm to hear that day's bingo numbers. Once a participant bingo-ed, they called the center, left their own voicemail with their winning bingo numbers and prize selection. Senior Center staff then packaged the prize and left it at a drop off location just outside the senior center building for participants to maintain contactless pickup. UPDATED TECHNOLOGY

In late 2019 and early 2020, BRADD assisted Edmonson County with technology upgrades including the development of purchase orders for laptops, desktops and computer software. Once the equipment was ordered and delivered, BRADD's Network Administrator then helped the County setup and install the software and computer equipment.

EDMONSON COUNTY

BONNIEVILLE FIRE STATION

In the fall of 2019, renovations were completed to the Bonnieville fire station with assistance from Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds. As part of the project, the fire department acquired and demolished a dilapidated building adjacent to the existing fire station. This allowed the fire station to be reconfigured and three large bay doors were installed on the side of the building. The additional bays provide extra space to get the trucks and equipment in and out, which results in faster response times. BRADD was pleased to assist with the development of the application and administration of the project.

FORT WEBB HOUSING

Through the Warren County Fiscal Court, the Housing Authority of Bowling Green (HABG) and its nonprofit corporation Live the Dream Development, Inc. received \$1,000,000 of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds to complete the second phase of an existing low-income elderly development. The project consisted of constructing twenty units of needed quality affordable housing for the low-income elderly residing in Warren County. The project was completed in August 2019.
