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A WORD FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



As the COVID-19 pandemic continued to dominate our year, we endured, stepped-up and reached for the stars to ensure our communities were equipped with all possible resources.

The close of fiscal year 2021 marked my fourth year at BRADD. Resiliency and perseverance were perhaps the theme for this most unique year. As the COVID-19 pandemic continued to dominate our year, we endured, stepped-up and reached for the stars to ensure our communities were equipped with all possible resources. Our region's local elected officials and community leaders were guiding lights for economic resiliency. Most importantly, we continued to experience stellar growth!

As of June 30, 2021, BRADD administered over \$16.2 million of local project investment through our Community & Economic Development department. Our talented Transportation Planner developed a comprehensive Regional Transportation Dashboard providing local decision makers new abilities for assessing infrastructure needs. In addition to developing over 36 grant applications for our communities, we **fully revolved** our Revolving Loan Fund program, providing 13 businesses over \$150,000 of investment, retaining over 300 jobs.

The hungry were fed. Over 205,800 nutritious meals were served to our seniors throughout the district. Our Area Agency on Aging & Independent Living ensured over 5,600 clients needs were met, expending nearly \$9.8 million of federal and state funding. These services include **rockstar** programs like Participant Directed Services, Family Caregiver, Homecare and Personal Care Attendant with Federal Title III Older American Act Services like Home Delivered Meals, Respite, and Case Management.

This fiscal year BRADD continued our path of conservative fiscal accountability and budgeting, as demonstrated in our low ratio of personnel costs to program dollars. The US Census Bureau highlights growth in over 80% of our communities, with our base in Warren County experiencing the most substantial growth, increasing in population 18.25%. We have the fastest growing region in the Commonwealth, with a 9.8% population growth from 2010-2020. On behalf of the BRADD, we present the fiscal year 2021 Annual Report as a **bright** testament to the work performed each and every day to improve the quality of life and economic well-being of our citizens.

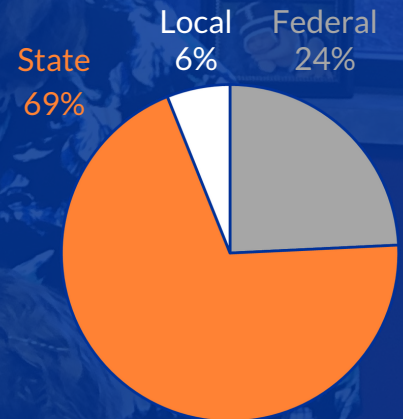

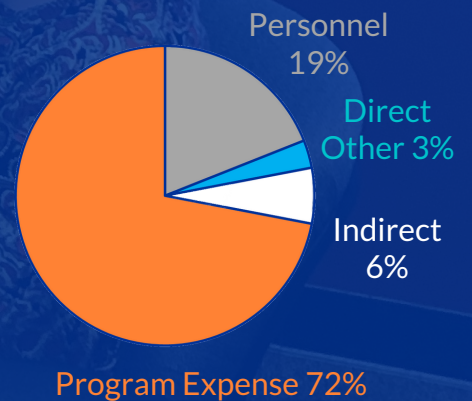

Year End FY21 Expenses

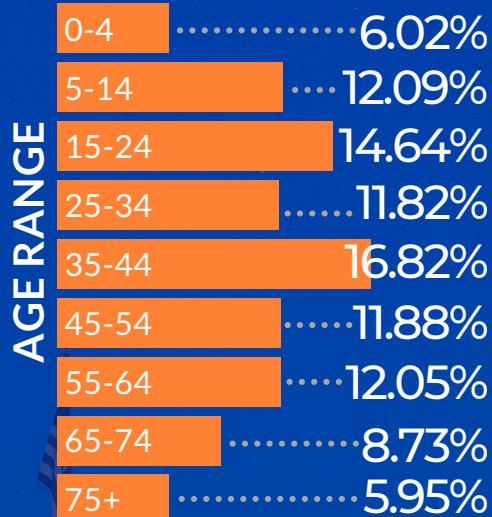

The Barren River Area Development District (BRADD) is a state and federal designated Area Agency on Aging and Independent Living (AAAIL) under the direction of the U. S. Administration on Aging and Community Living and under the supervision of the State Department for Aging and Independent Living. The BRADD holds the responsibility of developing and administering a wide variety of comprehensive, coordinated, and cost-effective, in-home and community based services. These serve to help older and disabled individuals to maintain their dignity and quality of life, while living safely in their homes and communities. Our programs are administered by staff, advised by the Barren River Aging Council and operated under the supervision of the BRADD Board of Directors.

REACHING THE REGION

During FY 2021, we were able to find new and creative ways to reach out to our community. In a time where health fairs, support groups, and other public events were on hold, we found new ways to get the word out about the programs and services we could offer. Through radio spots, TV appearances, and public advertising such as the billboard featured here, we hope to continue helping those in need no matter the challenges we continue to face.

BRADD is already seeing success from these efforts. The billboard resulted in 11 new clients participating in the Family Caregiver Support Program. It also created an opportunity to partner with WKU Athletics to provide a broader range of outreach for the community. Be sure to listen for radio announcements during WKU games and other spotlights showcasing BRADD's programming to an even wider audience.



My first encounter [with BRADD's services] was with my mother 13 years ago. I became her novice caregiver. BRADD offered support group meetings and respite. Before Covid-19 we often met for lunch or other support group meetings. We developed close friendships with others in the program.

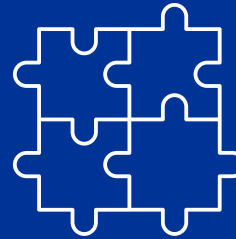

COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

BRADD's Planning and Development Department acts as a concierge for local elected leaders, community stakeholders, business owners, entrepreneurs, and economic developers who are looking to enhance the quality of life for citizens, attract new businesses, or retain/expand existing businesses within the 10-county region. This is accomplished through numerous community and economic development services provided by the department including community comprehensive planning, water and wastewater planning, transportation planning, emergency management planning, grant writing & administration, business services, GIS services, and technical assistance to local governments. Additionally, department staff regularly coordinate with various experts to provide our communities with quality training and information on a range of topics from planning & zoning to transit driver safety.

At the foundation of the department is the BRADD's Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (or CEDS). This guiding document is a critical mechanism that helps identify regional vulnerability and prevent or respond to economic disruptions; and is a critical component of economic resilience. Annually, the Planning & Development department reviews the BRADD's Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy and makes any needed updates. A full re-write of the plan is conducted every five years. Our current full CEDS, along with annual updates, can be found on our website: bradd.org.





UPDATING REGIONAL PLANS

In response to COVID-19, BRADD took a more holistic approach to strategic planning in our 10-county region by combining traditional Hazard Mitigation Planning with Community Development Planning to create a strong, more unified end product.

Working at the grassroots level, BRADD's Community Strategic Planning process partners with local steering committees to identify strategies and solutions that comprehensively tackle a community's vulnerabilities and leverage its strengths.

The goal is not for each county to restart or redo any existing planning efforts, but rather to ensure those listed goals within current plans have actionable steps and are still relevant to the community.

From January to July 2021, 48 local steering committee meetings were conducted and 3 large-scale regional meetings were held. This process will continue into Fiscal Year 2022 and will culminate with the approval of 10 local strategic plans, 1 Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan, and 1 Regional Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy in the Summer of 2022.

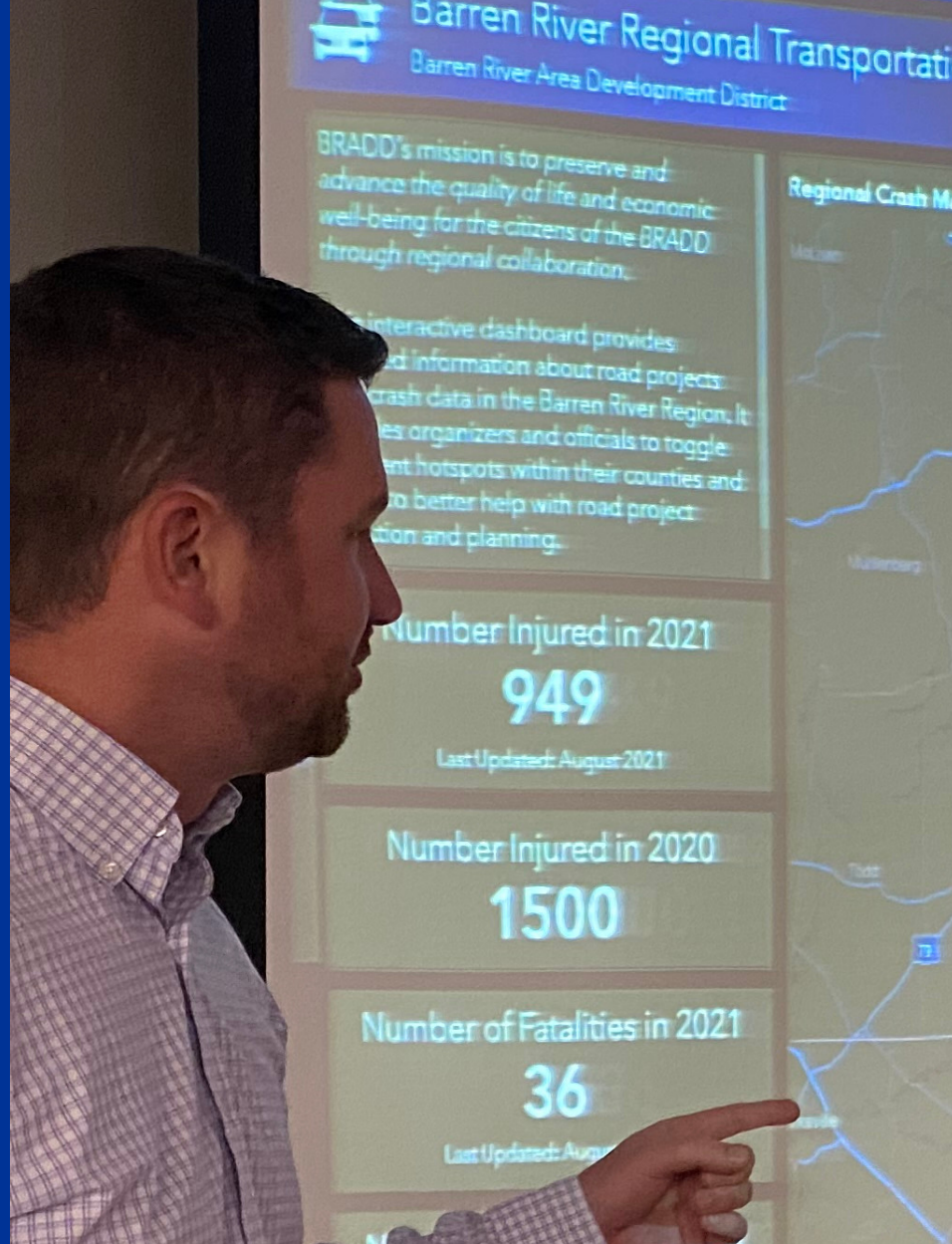

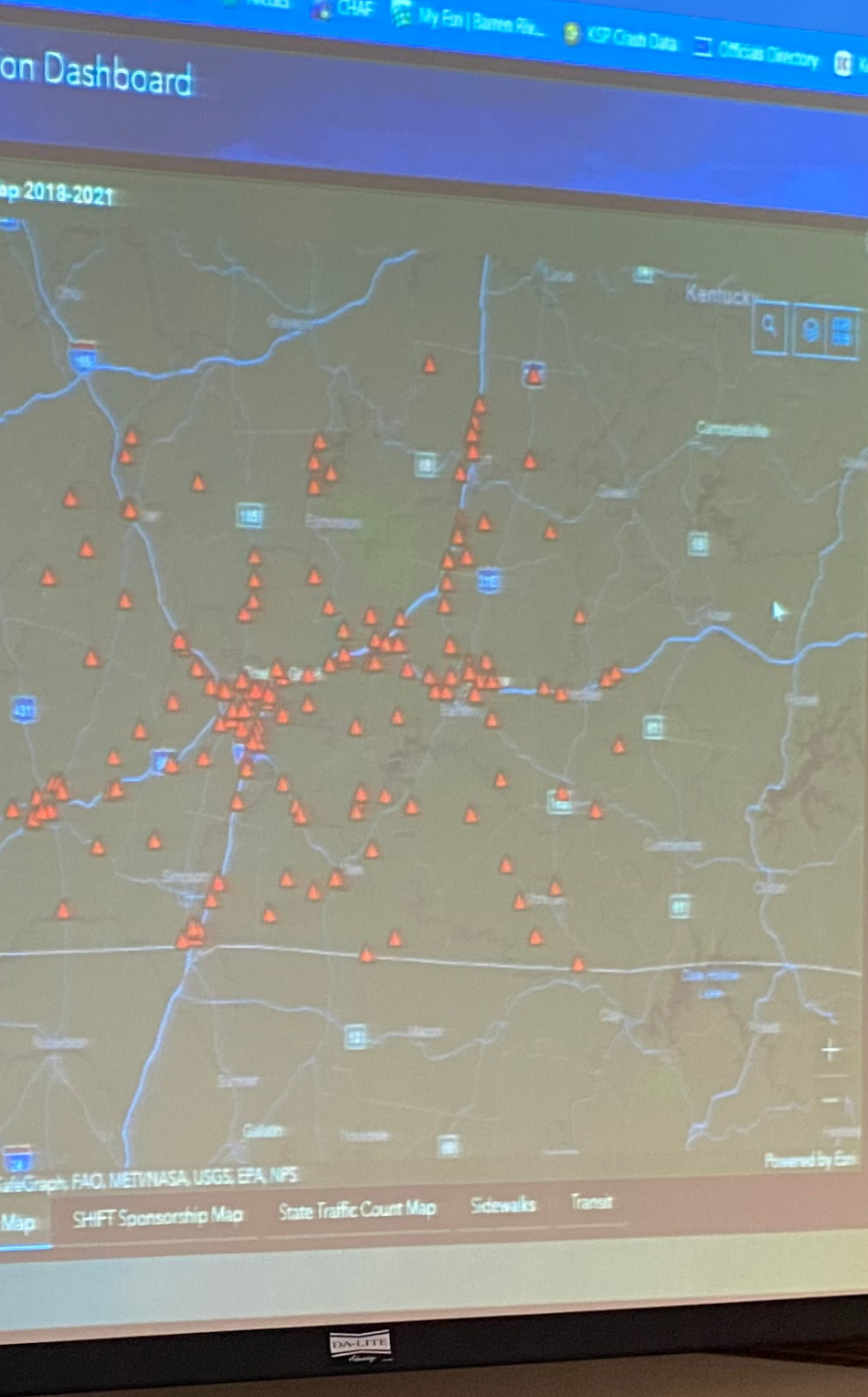

REGIONAL CRASH DATA DASHBOARD CREATED

In May of 2021, BRADD's Regional Transportation Planner designed an easy-to-use, interactive dashboard that combines transportation data from around the region. The Barren River Regional Transportation Dashboard utilizes vehicular crash data from the Kentucky State Police, combined with future road project designs and traffic volume data, to create a powerful tool for local officials and stakeholders in road project planning.

Other features included in the dashboard are local transit routes with socioeconomic data, a regional sidewalk database, KYTC District 3 and 4 weekly construction updates, and local live stream traffic cameras provided by the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet.

FRESH FLOWERS & PRODUCE

Allen County Senior Center and Fountain Run Nutrition site partnered with the Allen County High School Students, Need More Acres (www.needmoreacres.com) & Allen County Extension Office to offer fresh produce boxes which contained fresh produce, garden salad, strawberry milk, sourdough bread and a spring bouquet of fresh flowers to local Senior Citizens in the Scottsville and Fountain Run area. Need More Acres provided produce while the High School students helped with packing the boxes. The Home Extension helped by providing a grant for the project.

Community Action staff and volunteers from the senior center helped deliver boxes to the homebound and gave out boxes to seniors receiving curbside meals. The seniors were so excited and very appreciative.



CAVE CITY HOSPITALITY

In FY 21, BRADD was able to assist several businesses throughout our 10-county region using our Revolving Loan Fund Program, including Cave City Hospitality, LLC d/b/a Hampton Inn. This 74-unit Hampton Inn Hotel received \$100,000 in loan funds to be used for working capital needs during the COVID-19 pandemic. Cave City Hospitality also committed to hire 12 employees within one year of receiving the loan funds.

HART COUNTY WOODSON HOUSE

In FY21, Hart County received approval of their Recreational Trails Application to install a 1,200-foot-long concrete walkway that will meander through the Woodson House Historic Site providing an area for individuals to walk, jog, stroll, or bicycle. In addition to the construction of restrooms and water fountains at the site, benches will be situated throughout the trail to provide rest areas near wayside signage. All of these amenities will attract visitors to the Hart County Civil War Battlefield Trailhead and encourage heritage tourism while boosting the local economy.





LEWISBURG PLAYGROUND

In October 2020, the City of Lewisburg completed a playground improvement project funded by a Land and Water Conservation Grant of \$18,525. The City of Lewisburg matched this award 1 to 1 for a total project budget of \$37,050. Lewisburg Municipal Park, which houses baseball and softball fields, pavilions, playgrounds, and a concession stand and restroom facility, serves the citizens of Lewisburg by providing opportunities for both organized sport and casual outdoor play. The LWCF grant allowed the City to replace aging play structures in the primary playground area and replace lighting at the ballfields and pavilion. These upgrades improved park safety and usability, allowing the park to continue to serve Lewisburg residents. EDMONTON SITE SECURITY

In FY21, the City of Edmonton received State Homeland Security Program Funds to purchase security cameras and a keyless entry system for the Police Department/911 Dispatch. Mannned 24/7 with only a single dispatcher, the security cameras and keyless entry allow the facility to continue to operate safely. The accompanying video systems helps promote accountability for both the public and the department, and the keyless entry allows the dispatcher to remain at their post when allowing access to the building when needed.





MONROE CO. CENTRAL PARK

In FY21, the Monroe County Fiscal Court was awarded a 2020 Land and Water Conservation Fund grant for \$250,000 to construct Monroe Central Park. This project will transform a currently vacant lot into a large-scale park, including playgrounds, passive play areas, amphitheater and splash pad. The park will serve both citizens of Monroe County and visitors to the county. When completed, this park will be one of the only parks with a large-scale amphitheater and a splash pad in the BRADD region.
